• QIDA/SC QIDA



- Allows QTIP to gather standardized data
- 4 topics areas -- report 2/month using 10 charts/topic
- SC QIDA remains open until 15th of each month
- Practices have the freedom to select what to work on -- "not practice priority" option
- Allows practices to develop run charts and examine data and develop quality projects

Preventative Oral Health

- 10 of 10 (99.4%) eligible children visited a Physician
- Only 4 out of 10 (43%) eligible children visited the dental provider
- Only 5% eligible Medicaid children (0 – 5) received fluoride Varnish by a Physician
- Only 41% of Medicaid children (0-5) received fluoride varnish from a dental provider
- Only 8% of Medicaid children seen by a physician received fluoride varnish more than 1 application in a calendar year

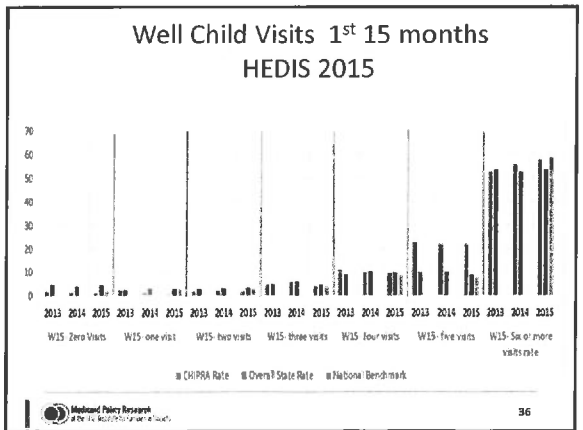

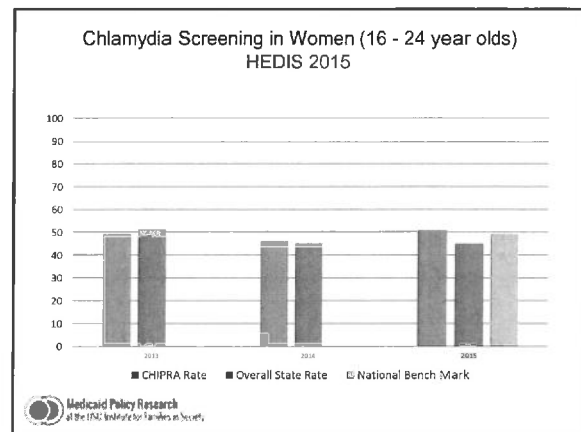
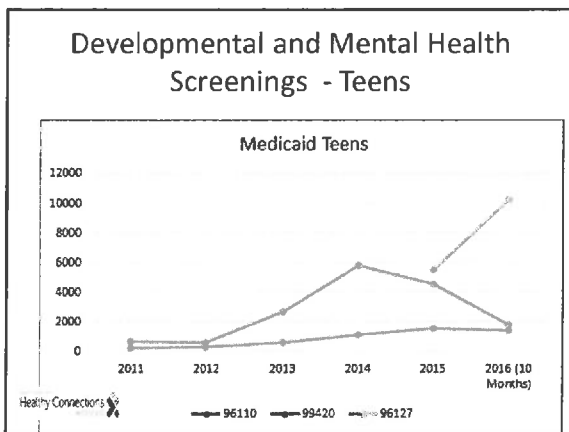
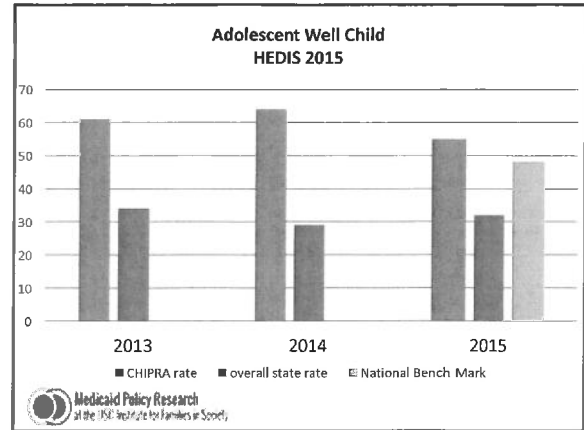
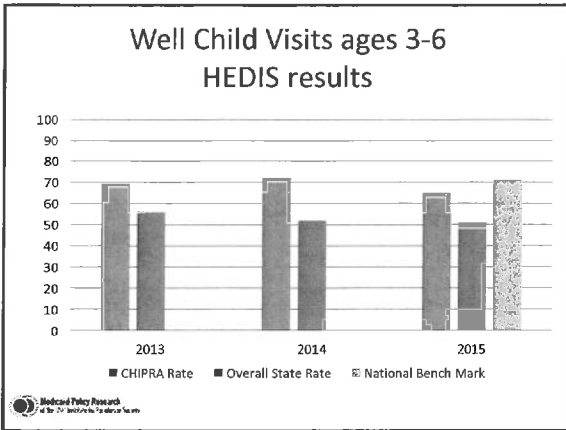
- DHHS reviewing policy about Fluoride varnishing frequency
- Physician intervention important and where children are first and most frequently seen
- Continued education is needed with physician and dental community
